Take advantage of a fantastic opportunity to study what makes us human and understand the forces that have shaped, and continue to shape, our species. Using a seminar format, students investigate a number of questions about humans including: When and how did humans evolve? Why do people have different skin colors or facial shapes? Does the environment affect fertility? Can chimpanzee behavior tell us about the origins of human culture? Why is sex fun? What is the role of our evolution in determining social hierarchy, gender roles? Did hunting and its requirements for cooperation and intelligence make us human? Did we destroy the Neanderthals? Collaborative, cooperative approaches to learning are stressed with students taking leadership roles in discussions, projects and written assignments.
