How do I add a class after the term has started?

Obtain an "Add Code" from the instructor of the class you want to register for (either attend the first class meeting or for online classes contact the instructor or attend the orientation session).

"Add Codes" can only be used during the Add period at the beginning of the term (after the class has started).

Each **Add Code** is a unique number that is specific to adding the course you have inquired about. This code, once entered on the registration screen on WebAdvisor, will authorize you to register for this course. If you have a hold on your account (due to outstanding fees, residency issues or other), you will have to take care of the hold prior to using your Add Code to register for the course.

Use WebAdvisor online at www.cabrillo.edu to use your "Add Code" to add a class.

- Go to Search and Register
- Select the section for which you have the Add code
- Under Action > select "Register"
- In the Add Code field, type in the 4-digit code you were given.
- Scroll down to the bottom of the page and click on the Submit button.
- Payment for your tuition and fees is due and must be received by the college within five business days of when you registered for classes.

Frequently Asked Questions:

Who can attend Cabrillo College?

You must be at least 18 years old or have one of the following:

- a high school diploma.
- a certificate of passing the California High School Proficiency Examination or General Education Development Examination (GED).
- a certificate of high school completion.

Can I attend Cabrillo College if I am still a High School student?

If you are still in high school, you may take a maximum of 6 units each semester. Some restrictions apply. You need to complete the following:

1. An **Application for Admission (available online)** and a **High School Release form**. Please be sure to sign the High School Release form. This release, available at your high school, must be signed by your principal or designee, your parent/legal guardian, and in some cases, a Cabrillo Counselor.
2. An **Assessment Test**: required for English and math courses.
3. High School students cannot take 200 level courses.

How do I enroll at Cabrillo College?

New students, concurrent high school students, or students who have not applied or attended Cabrillo College since summer 2010 should complete the online application for enrollment at www.cabrillo.edu. Students who have applied within the previous year do not need to reapply, and can register online at www.cabrillo.edu.

What day can I register for classes?

- Continuing students begin registration on April 11, 2011. (Continuing students are college students who were registered for Spring 2011)
- New, re-entry, and High School students who have applied and completed assessment and orientation begin registration on April 18, 2011.

When can I register?

Registration hours (WebAdvisor):

- Students may start registering on their assigned registration date and time. After that, students may drop/add classes between 6 am–1:30am, seven days a week.

How can I register?

- Online: www.cabrillo.edu click on "Web Advisor Self-Service."
- In person: Admissions & Records offices.

Can I still register after classes begin?

Yes, if space is available! In-person late registration dates are:

June 13 & 14 (1st four-week and six-week sessions)

Hours: Monday and Tuesday, 8:00a.m.–6:00p.m.

Where: 1) Aptos: Enrollment Services Center, Building 100, Admissions & Records OR
2) Watsonville Center: 318 Union St, Watsonville, Admissions & Records

How does late registration work?

If space is available in a full-term class when school begins, you can obtain authorization from the instructor. All registrations for summer classes must be processed by June 14, 2011.

What if I cannot attend the first class?

You must contact your instructor before the first class meeting and ask if you may remain in the class. You will still be charged for the fees even if you do not attend, unless you formally drop the class. Refer to "How do I drop a class" for more information.

I am having problems registering. What could be the problem?

- **Delinquent fees (registration fees, library fines, etc.):** must be paid before you can register or drop courses.
- **Academic or progress dismissal:** must meet with a Cabrillo College Counselor.
- **More than the maximum number of units:** must meet with a Cabrillo College Counselor.
- **Prerequisites not completed:** either take an assessment test or show prior coursework.
- **Corequisites:** must register in corequisites as stated in the *Schedule of Classes*.
- **Overlapping courses:** must obtain an overlap petition signed by the two instructors and return it to Admissions & Records.
- **Repetition of a course:** must submit a repeat petition and meet one of the requirements.
- **Application or residency problem:** you must see Admissions & Records staff.

The course I want to take has a prerequisite and/or a corequisite course listed. Do I have to take that course first?

Yes. You must have satisfactorily completed the prerequisite or co-requisite listed before you can enroll in the following course. You can meet this requirement in several ways: take the course listed, show proof of completion of the same course from another college, or "challenge" the pre or co-requisite course. The "challenge process" allows you to show a faculty committee that you have the knowledge and/or skills that would have been acquired in the pre or co-requisite course. If successful, you may skip the pre or co-requisite course. There are forms and timelines you must follow. How can I pay for my tuition and fees costs?

You can pay your tuition and fees using Cash, Visa/MasterCard, Check, or a Money Order.

There are several ways to pay your fees. You can use WebAdvisor, the College Bank, Secure Drop Boxes at each of the Cabrillo College locations, Watsonville or Aptos, or by mailing your payment to:

What about my privacy rights?

Student information is confidential and not released to the public except for information designated as "Directory Information." Directory information is (a) student name, (b) participation in recognized activities and sports, (c) dates of attendance, (d) degrees and awards received, (e) the most recent previous educational agency or institution attended. Students who do not want Directory information released must notify Admissions & Records in writing. The Cabrillo College Catalog describes student record access and privacy rights as required by the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (Section 438, Public Law 93-380) in more detail. I am a parent of a high school student attending Cabrillo College. Can I access my child's student records?

No. Under Section 49061 of the Education Code, parents of community college students do not have the right of access to their children's student records, regardless of whether the student is under the age of 18. Also, under federal law (Section 1232G of Title 20 of the United States Code), there is a general right of parental access to student records, but not for college students, regardless of age.

Frequently Asked Questions

What are residency requirements for Cabrillo College?

To qualify as a California resident, you must meet the following criteria:

1. You have lived in California for at least one year and a day before the beginning of the semester.
2. You can demonstrate your intent to establish California residence. The list of approved documents is available online at www.cabrillo.edu and in Admissions & Records.

In addition to the above, if you are:

1. **18 years old** and one of your parents has lived in California the required time.
2. **Under 18 years old** and your parent has lived in California the required time.
3. **Not a United States citizen** you must be able to verify that you have applied for residency with the United States Citizenship and Immigrations Services (USCIS) at least one year and one day immediately preceding the beginning of the semester, or that you have a visa that allows you to establish California residency.

AB 540 allows certain nonresident students who have attended three years of high school in California and received a high school diploma or its equivalent exemption from paying nonresident tuition.

Remember: If your residency status changes from nonresident to resident while you are enrolled at Cabrillo, you must submit a new application for admission with a statement of legal residence and documentation to Admissions & Records to change your status. We will not make retroactive changes.

What if I'm a resident of another state?

Residents of other states must pay nonresident tuition and fees. See fee chart on page 10.

What if I'm an International Student?

Students from other countries pay higher International student tuition and fees. See chart on page 10. For fall 2011 semester, you must submit an International Student Application for admission by July 1, 2011. International student admission requirements are listed in the Cabrillo College *Catalog*. Can I take a course more than one time?

You may repeat a course under the conditions specified in the *Catalog*. If you want to repeat a course that is not designated as repeatable, obtain a course repetition petition from Admissions & Records before you register. In order to register for the class, obtain the appropriate signatures, if necessary, and return to Admissions & Records.

How can I get a transcript? How much do they cost?

Obtain transcripts from Admissions & Records in either Aptos or the Watsonville Center. The first two transcripts are free to all students; after that the cost is \$3 for each additional transcript. There are additional fees for "rush" transcripts. For more information, see:

How do I find out about textbooks?

Information about all textbooks can be found on <http://cabrillobooks.net/>. Required and recommended texts can be found there, including the price and the ISBN number for the books.

What is Assessment?

Cabrillo's assessment (placement testing) service will provide you with information about your skill levels and placement in English, English as a Second Language (ESL) reading, and math courses. It is not a college admissions test.

Assessment requirements:

1. Have an application on file at Admissions & Records five days in advance of your test.
2. Know your social security number or Cabrillo Student ID number.
3. Bring a photo ID.
4. Have a working email address.

What do I do first?

WHO NEEDS ASSESSMENT?

- **You need assessment** if you plan to do any of the following:
 1. Earn an AA or AS degree or certificate.
 2. Satisfy math, English, chemistry or other course prerequisites.
 3. Register for ESL classes.
 4. Register for more than six units.
- **You DO NOT need assessment** if you show a counselor or Admissions & Records documentation for one of the following:
 1. Successful completion of previous college level math or English course(s).
 2. Placement results from another California community college.
 3. Advanced Placement (AP) Test with scores of 3, 4, or 5 in English or calculus.

Do I need to participate in Orientation?

Yes. Orientation is one of the important ways to become knowledgeable about and integrated into college. It is one of the Matriculation services we provide for your planned progress towards your educational goal. There are several ways to meet this requirement. You may complete an online orientation from home or in selected locations on campus. Log into <https://sirena.cabrillo.edu> You may also complete this requirement by attending a counselor-led session offered after some of the assessment tests where your scores will be distributed. You can also enroll in CG 51 (a credit class). All orientation options will review college programs and majors, support services, success strategies and ways to maximize your time at Cabrillo.

Where do I get more information about Assessment and Orientation?

Do I take an assessment test for an ESL class?

YES! ESL students must take a placement test in order to register for ESL classes. The ESL assessment test will recommend the best class for your skills. There will be an orientation following many of the ESL Assessment sessions. Check the schedule or ask the staff. All schedules for ESL assessment tests are available the Assessment Office, the Watsonville Center and online at www.cabrillo.edu/services/assessment.

Open enrollment

It is the policy of Cabrillo College that, unless specifically exempted by statute, every course, course section, or class that is reported for state apportionment, wherever offered and maintained by the district, shall be fully open to enrollment and participation by any person who has been admitted to the college and who meets such prerequisites and selection procedures as may be established by Title 5 of the California Administrative Code, commencing with Section 55200.

Usted puede tomar clases en Cabrillo aunque no sepa mucho inglés. Además del programa de inglés como segunda lengua, le ofrecemos una variedad de cursos y servicios en español que han sido creados especialmente para estudiantes hispanohablantes y a los cuales le invitamos a asistir.

How can I get a refund or reversal of charges for a class?

Refunds or reversal of charges apply only if you officially drop a full-term class on or before first day of class. If the class is canceled, your tuition and fees will be refunded. Different deadlines apply for short-term courses.

The Admissions & Records Office DOES NOT drop students when fees are not paid, and fees remain payable even if you do not attend, unless you officially drop the class before the refund deadline. If you decide not to continue in a class, drop the class yourself. If you wait for the instructor to drop you, you will not receive a refund or reversal of charges.

Parking permits must be turned in by the same deadline for refunds.

All refunds or disbursements are available through the Cabrillo Access Debit MasterCard. Go to CabrilloAccessCard.com to select the refund or disbursement option that is best for you. Make sure your mailing address is current by keeping it updated on WebAdvisor to ensure receipt of CabrilloAccessCard.

What is the deadline for refund/reversal of charges of transportation fees?

Parking permits may be returned on or before the first day of class for a full refund or reversal of charges. No transportation fees will be reversed or refunded after June 13, 2011.

Tuition & Fees

Tuition & Fees: Mandatory

(set by the California Legislature and subject to change):

1. Tuition

Non-Resident of California	\$183 Tuition per unit \$ 26 <i>plus</i> per unit enrollment fee
International Students	\$183 Tuition per unit \$ 26 <i>plus</i> per unit enrollment fee \$ 5 <i>plus</i> per unit capital outlay fee*

*The capital outlay fee may be waived for economic hardship or for the victim of persecution or discrimination in their home countries.

2. Health Services Fee \$ 14

The Student Health Services fee provides access to a variety of services. For more information, see Student Services or www.cabrillo.edu.

Ed Code Section 76355 allows exemption from this fee solely to those students who depend upon prayer for healing in accordance with the teachings of a bona fide religious sect, denomination or organization. Petition forms are available in Admissions & Records. Documentation of religious affiliation is required. Board of Governors' Waiver (BOG) students will be charged the Health Services fee.

What fees are optional

What fees are optional?

1. Parking Permit \$ 40 or \$20 for BOG students
2. Children's Center Fund \$ 2
3. Student Activity Card* \$ 8

What if my fees are paid by an Agency?

If an agency or program is paying your fees, a voucher or "authorization to bill" must be sent instead of a payment within five days of registration. Remember to keep a copy of the voucher or authorization. Cabrillo will send a bill to the agency or program. Fee-paying agencies or programs include (but are not limited to): CareerWorks, Summer Migrant Program, E.D.D., Disability Compensation, Veterans Programs, Employers.

Oops. My check bounced.

A \$25 service fee will be charged for all checks and credit card transactions returned to the college for account difficulties. If your check or credit card transaction is returned, you will be notified by mail. Your registration and transcripts will be held until all delinquencies are cleared. Returned check delinquencies may not be paid with another personal check, but must be paid with cash, money order or cashier's check.

The California State Legislature is considering a fee increase. If fees increase, you will be responsible to pay the new amount. Admissions & Records will post any fee changes on our website and mail revised registration statements. Check on WebAdvisor to ensure that your address is accurate and, if applicable, pay your fees.

Cabrillo College Mission Statement:

Computerized prerequisite verification is required to enroll in Math.

All students enrolling in a math class must have in the Cabrillo computer system either Cabrillo math assessment scores, prerequisite course grade, or transcripts verifying their math preparation. It is strongly recommended that the prerequisite course work not be more than two years old. A minimum grade of "C" is required in the prerequisite course.

New students without transfer credit in math from another college must complete assessment in math before attempting to enroll in any math course that has a prerequisite.

New students with transfer credit in math from another college and high school students with math AP exam scores of 3 or higher do not need to assess but must see a counselor to have their records input into the computer before attempting to register.

High school students without appropriate AP scores must complete assessment in math.

Minors without a high school diploma may not enroll in Math 254A, 254B or 254CM.

Notice: The following resources are available for drop-in tutoring for Cabrillo students enrolled in math classes: Math Learning Center (MLC), Room 1074, and the Integrated Learning Center, Room 4410 in the Watsonville Center. MORE INFORMATION ON ASSESSMENT AND ORIENTATION

WHAT DO I DO FIRST?

Submit an application to Admissions & Records five (5) days before the test.

CAN I BE EXEMPT FROM ASSESSMENT AND ORIENTATION?

Yes, under certain circumstances if:

1. you already have an AA, AS or higher degree. Yet, if you are enrolling in a class that requires a pre or corequisite that you may have completed too long ago (e.g. math recency is 2 years) you will NOT be exempt.
2. you are taking less than six units.

WHAT DO I NEED AT THE ASSESSMENT?

1. Know your social security number or Cabrillo Student ID number.
2. Bring a photo ID.

CAN I WAIVE ASSESSMENT AND ORIENTATION?

Yes, any student may seek a waiver from matriculation services (assessment, orientation, and counseling) by completing a "Request to Waive Matriculation Services." The form is available in the offices of Admissions & Records, Assessment, Counseling, at the Watsonville Center and Scotts Valley Centers, online, and in SAC 213 (Aptos). Waiving the assessment DOES NOT allow you to bypass course pre- and corequisites. Waiving orientation and counseling/educational planning will probably decrease your knowledge about the college, its services and policies and may result in added time and incorrect selection of needed classes. If you do waive matriculation services, you can always participate in them at a later date.

MAY I RE-ASSESS IF I DO NOT THINK MY SCORES SHOW MY SKILL LEVEL?

Yes, you may retest one time during a six month period. There is a one week waiting period between the initial test and the retest.

MATH NOTE:

- In order to be placed in the correct math class, we encourage students to take the practice tests before they assess. A short time reviewing the material prior to the test can frequently place students in a higher level class and save them both time and money.
- Once a student has enrolled in a math class and either received a letter grade for the class or dropped the class with a grade of "W," the student MAY NOT retest in order to place into a higher level class.

ORIENTATION

Attending an orientation will answer many questions about college. College is very different from high school and the expectations around managing your time, balancing your personal and academic life, and financing your education will all be addressed. The history of the college, how to register and the best ways to transfer to a four year university or pursue a career will be covered. Many students are undecided about their goals when they begin community college. Orientation will address these issues with a group of students who have similar questions and concerns.

Developing an education plan with a counselor is another important step to complete a college program or degree or to transfer to a university. Using these Matriculation services will help students reach their goals in the most efficient timeframe and help them select the correct classes.

If a student believes he/she does not want to take the assessment test, participate in orientation or receive counseling, he/she can "waive" those services. This does not exempt the student from meeting the prerequisite and co-requisite requirements for some classes. Parking Regulations

The California Vehicle Code is enforced on campus. Students must have parking permits to park on campus in student lots. It is recommended that students select a parking permit when they register. A student who does not purchase a parking permit must pay \$4 (exact change only; some machines will accept debit/credit cards only) for a day permit in a student lot. The first week of the semester is a grace period in all of the student lots only. Tickets will be written the first week in all staff lots, specially posted areas and in the visitor parking meters. Ticketing will begin in all campus lots the second week of classes.

Final Transcripts Prior To Transfer

In your last semester at Cabrillo, once you have determined where you will transfer, you may request your final Cabrillo transcript and certification of your General Education (IGETC or CSU General Education) by submitting the final Transcript and IGETC/General Education Request Form to the Admissions & Records Office at Aptos or the Watsonville Center. IGETC and GE certifications are not done on a rush basis.

Grades

Grades will be available on WebAdvisor (www.cabrillo.edu). Copies are also available at Admissions & Records at Aptos and the Watsonville Center. Be sure to check your grades. Questions about grades should be directed immediately to the instructor.

How To Order Transcripts

Students may request transcripts by submitting the Official Transcript Request form to the Admissions & Records Office. The first two transcripts ever ordered are free. Each additional transcript is \$3. Students who need transcripts in less than 10 business days can pay a rush fee starting at \$7. IGETC and GE certifications are not done on a rush fee basis and are not available for pickup as they will be mailed directly to the institution as indicated by the student. **Bring a photo ID to pick up documents.**

Smoking Policy

Smoking at Cabrillo College is permitted ONLY in designated areas of parking lots. There is a covered smoking area in parking lot "J" for use in inclement weather. Smoking in non-designated areas is subject to citation and college discipline.

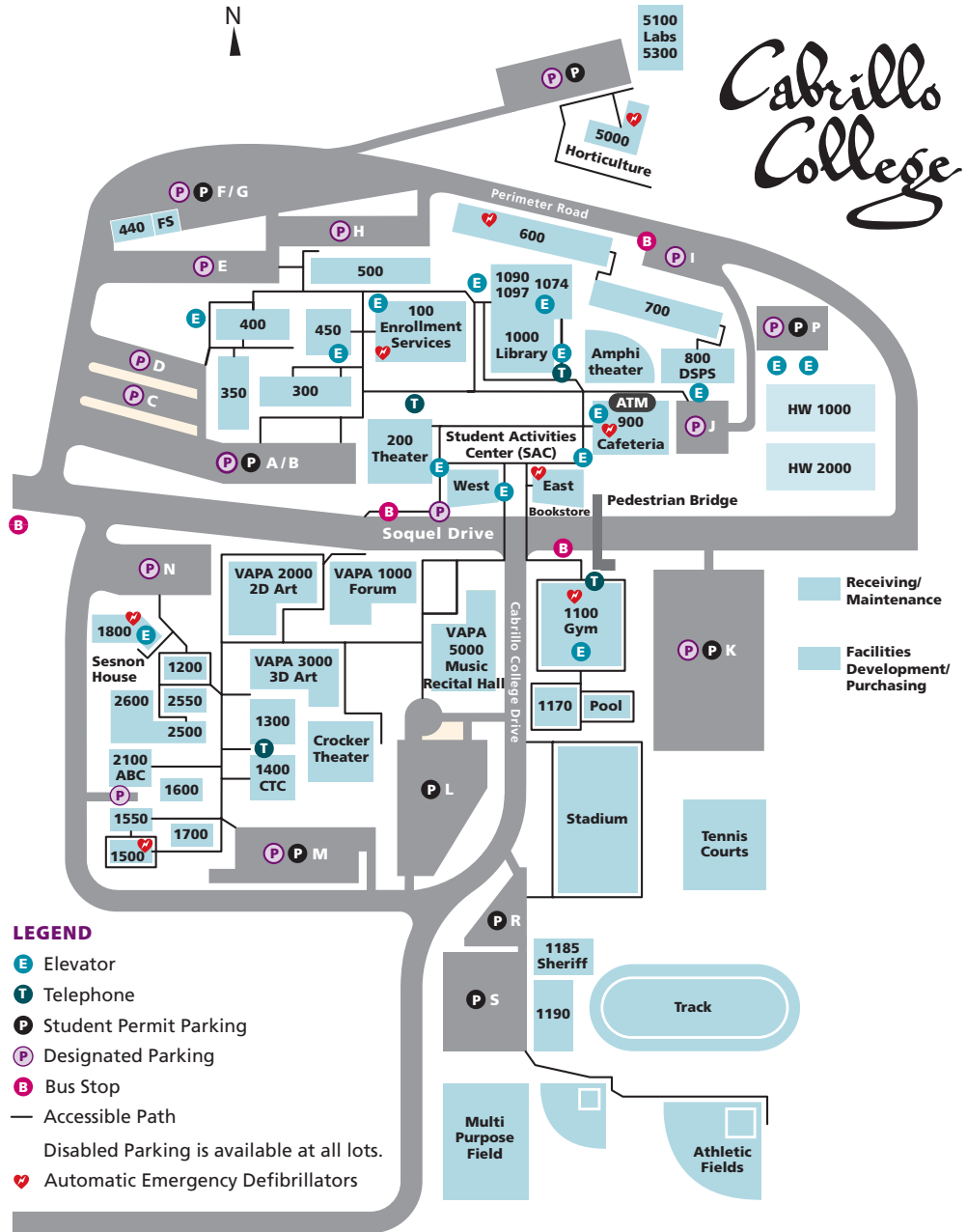
