How to Register

Wintersession 2008

In just four short weeks of intensive study, you can earn college credit toward your degree, transfer, or certificate program. Registration Dates

Continuing students (those registered in Wintersession, spring, summer or fall 2007), except concurrently enrolled high school students, may register from October 22 through January 6, 2008 using HawkTalk or WebAdvisor.

All other students must submit an application for admission seven working days before registering and may register from October 29 through January 6. Apply online at www.cabrillo.edu or the application form on pages 17-18 in this *Schedule of Classes*. Concurrently enrolled high school students must submit a high school release form with the application. These documents may be mailed or hand delivered to Admissions and Records at Aptos or Watsonville, or faxed to (831) 479-5782.

Waitlists

If a class is full you may add your name, without charge, to the waitlist. Once you are on the waitlist, you must check your status regularly in case you are given permission, either by e-mail or postal mail, to register. Make sure Admissions and Records has your current contact information. If you are still on the waitlist when classes start, you must go to the first day of class and obtain an add slip from the instructor.

Late Registration

On January 7 and 8, students who have missed online or telephone registration may register in person after obtaining an add slip from the instructor of the class. Late registration hours on January 7 and 8 are from 8 a.m. to 7:30 p.m. in Enrollment Services Center (Bldg. 100), Aptos, or at the Admissions and Records office in the Watsonville Center.

Dropping a course with a refund

Courses must be officially dropped as of the first class meeting to receive a refund/reversal of charges. Refund checks will be mailed to the last known address of the student.

Accreditation

Cabrillo is accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges. Appropriate courses transfer to the University of California, the California State University system, and/or private four-year institutions.

Registration Guidelines

Before you begin:

1. All delinquent fees (e.g., unpaid enrollment fees, library fines, returned check fees) must be paid to the College Bank before you register.
2. Complete the Registration Worksheet on page 16.
3. Be sure you have met all course prerequisites listed in the *Schedule of Classes*. See page 31 of the Cabrillo College *Catalog* (2007-2008) or <http://www.cabrillo.edu/services/matriculation> then go to pdf forms.
4. Corequisites: you must register for both courses in the same registration session.
5. To register for more than the maximum number of units, (18 units) you must have counselor approval.
6. If you are on academic or progress dismissal, you must meet with a counselor.
7. The following require approval and must be added in person at the Admissions and Records Office, Aptos Campus or Watsonville Center:
 - a) Overlapping courses;
 - b) Repetition of a course more than the maximum times allowed. See the Cabrillo College *Catalog*.
8. Choose your waitlist carefully; you can only be on one waitlist per course.
9. Waitlisted courses will appear on registration statements. You are not enrolled in a waitlisted course until you have officially registered, either by
 - a) online or telephone registration, after you receive permission to register notification; or
 - b) obtaining an add slip from the instructor, when the class starts, and bringing it to Admissions and Records offices for processing.You should check your status regularly in case you are given permission to register, either by e-mail or postal mail. Make sure Admissions and Records has your current contact information. If you are still on the waitlist when classes start, you must go to the first day of class and obtain an add slip from the instructor.
10. Once selected, optional fees cannot be deleted on WebAdvisor online registration or HawkTalk. Please contact Admissions and Records for assistance.

Open Enrollment

It is the policy of Cabrillo College that, unless specifically exempted by statute, every course, course section, or class that is reported for state apportionment, wherever offered and maintained by the district, shall be fully open to enrollment and participation by any person who has been admitted to the college and who meets such prerequisites and selection procedures as may be established pursuant to Title 5 of the California Administrative Code, commencing with Section 55200.

Before you enroll in courses numbered 1- 199, you should be eligible for ENGL 100 and READ 100. Eligibility for these courses can be met through assessment or by successfully completing their pre-requisites.

Fees and Information

FEES

- You will not be able to add or drop courses, receive transcripts, and your name may be sent to the California State Franchise Tax Board if your fees become delinquent.
- Please keep your registration statement. It is a full history of your classes and fees.
- Photo I.D. required for printed registration statements.
- Cash payments are accepted at the College Bank only, M-F, 9a.m.–3:30p.m.
- Enrollment fees are set by the California Legislature for all community colleges and are subject to change.

Mandatory Fees

California Resident Enrollment Fee. . . \$ 20 per unit

Non-Resident of California: \$174 tuition per unit plus \$20 per unit enrollment fee

International Students: \$174 tuition plus \$3 capital outlay fee per unit plus \$20 per unit enrollment fee

Note: The capital outlay fee may be waived for economic hardship, or for victims of persecution or discrimination in their home countries.

Health Services Fee: \$ 13 Mandatory

The Student Health Services fee provides a variety of services. For more information, see Student Services or www.cabrillo.edu. Ed Code Section 76355 allows exemption from this fee solely to those students who depend upon prayer for healing in accordance with the teachings of a bona fide religious sect, denomination or organization, or for students attending Cabrillo under an approved apprenticeship training program.

Parking

During Wintersession 2008 students who park in student lots must pay \$2 per day.

Ride the Bus

For Wintersession 2008, the bus pass to ride to school will cost \$10. Contact the Student Affairs office for a Wintersession bus pass.

Returned Checks

A \$15 service fee will be charged for all checks returned to the college for account difficulties. Your registration and transcripts will be held until all delinquencies are cleared. Returned check delinquencies can only be paid with cash, money order, or cashier's check.

Financial Aid

Tuition and Fee Refunds Deadline

To receive a refund or reversal of charges for registration or optional fees, students must officially drop on or before the first class meeting. Based on state statute, Cabrillo College can only refund fees or reverse charges after the deadline for the following reasons:

1. Reduced unit load as of the first class meeting;
2. Fees collected in error;
3. Classes cancelled by the college.

All Cabrillo College refunds will be by check and will be mailed to the last known address of the student. Cabrillo cannot credit a MasterCard or VISA, unless the payment is made on WebAdvisor online. A \$10 processing fee will be charged for all refunds, except for cancelled classes. If the refund is \$10 or less, it will be applied to the processing fee.

Placement Assessment

Students must complete prerequisites and corequisites prior to enrolling in courses with requisites. If these were completed at other colleges, official transcripts must be presented to the admissions or counseling offices so the documentation may be entered into the computerized system to allow enrollment.

A student may challenge a pre- or corequisite by following the process on the "Requisite Challenge Form" described in the catalog, available on the Cabrillo website under Matriculation, or in the Admission and Assessment Offices. The Matriculation Office can answer any additional questions, (831) 477-3242, Room 820.

Students can choose not to participate in matriculation services (assessment, orientation and counseling) by completing the form "Request to Waive Matriculation Services" available in the above noted locations. This, however, does not allow a student to enroll in classes with pre- or corequisites they have not yet completed.






Who May Be Admitted

Students must be at least 18 years of age, or have one of the following documents with their application:

- High School Release form (for every concurrent high school student);
- General Education Degree (GED); or
- High School Diploma; or
- High School Equivalent Certificate.
