Upcoming trips to England and Argentina for Summer 2010 are also featured in this *Schedule of Classes*.

Frequently Asked Questions:

Who can attend Cabrillo College?

You must be at least 18 years old or have one of the following:

- a high school diploma.
- a certificate of passing the California High School Proficiency Examination or General Education Development Examination (GED).
- a certificate of high school completion.

Can I attend Cabrillo College if I am still a High School student?

If you are still in high school, you may take a maximum of 3 units during wintersession. Some restrictions apply. You need to complete the following:

1. An Application for Admission and a High School Release form (both must be submitted together): Please be sure to sign the application and High School Release form. This release, available at your high school, must be signed by your principal or designee, your parent/legal guardian; and in some cases, a Cabrillo Counselor.
2. An Assessment Test: required for English and math courses.
3. High School students cannot take 200 level courses.

How do I enroll at Cabrillo College?

File an application for admission with Admissions and Records if you are a new student, concurrent high school student, or have not applied or attended since Fall 2008. Apply online at www.cabrillo.edu or submit the application in this Schedule of Classes prior to registering for classes.

What day can I register for classes?

- Continuing students begin registration on October 26, 2009
- New and High School students begin registration on November 2, 2009.

At what time can I register?

Registration hours (WebAdvisor and HawkTalk):

- Students may start registering on their assigned registration date and time. After that, students may drop/add classes between 6 am - 1:30am, seven days a week.

How can I register?

How does late registration work?

If space is available in a full-term class when school begins, you can obtain authorization from the instructor. All registration must be processed on or before the first day of class.

What if I cannot attend the first class?

You must contact your instructor before the first class meeting and ask if you may remain in the class. You will still be charged for the fees even if you do not attend, unless you formally drop the class on or before the first day of class.

I am having problems registering. What could be the problem?

- Delinquent fees (registration fees, library fines, etc.): must be paid before you can register or drop courses.
- Academic or progress dismissal: must meet with a Cabrillo College Counselor.
- More than the maximum number of units: must meet with a Cabrillo College Counselor.
- Prerequisites not completed: either take an assessment test or show prior coursework.
- Corequisites: must register in corequisites as stated in the *Schedule of Classes*.
- Overlapping courses: must obtain an overlap petition signed by the two instructors and return it to Admissions and Records.
- Repetition of a course: must submit a repeat petition and meet one of the requirements.
- Application or residency problem: you must see Admissions and Records staff.
- Current address needed: update your contact information through WebAdvisor or in person at Admissions and Records.

How do I drop a class?

Use WebAdvisor online at www.cabrillo.edu or HawkTalk at (831) 479-4295 to drop a class.

- To receive a refund or have charges reversed you must officially drop the class on or before the first class meeting.
- To avoid a "W" grade, please contact your instructor or Admissions & Records
- To avoid an "F" or "NP" grade, please contact your instructor or Admissions & Records

It is the student's responsibility to drop a class. Do not assume that you are automatically dropped from any class, or that your instructor has dropped you from the class. If you wait for the instructor to drop you, you will not receive a refund or reversal of charges, and you may earn a failing grade.

Students receiving financial aid who plan to completely withdraw should file an Intent to Withdraw Form with the Financial Aid Office.

The class I want to take is full. Can I get on a waitlist?

Yes! If the class section you would like to take is full (closed) at the time you register, you may choose to be placed on the class section waitlist. Be sure Admissions and Records has your correct mailing and e-mail address on file.

- You may add your name, without charge, to the waitlist.
- If space becomes available in the closed section, the first person on the waitlist will become eligible to register in that class section. You can do this by using the Manage My Waitlist in WebAdvisor to confirm your place in the class.
- Every effort will be made to notify you by e-mail or letter when a space opens up, but it is your responsibility to monitor your position on the waitlist and to register if a space becomes available to you.
- You will have eight (8) calendar days to register from the time the space becomes available, or your name will be dropped from the waitlist.
- Other students on the waitlist will move up and be allowed to register as space becomes available.
- You can only be waitlisted for one section of a course at any one time.

Students still on waitlists when classes begin must attend class the first day, obtain authorization to register, and complete the registration process by the deadline.

When do I have to pay my tuition and fees?

Payment for your tuition and fees is due and must be received by the college within 5 business days of when you registered for classes.

How can I pay for my tuition and fees costs?

You can pay your tuition and fees cost using Cash, Visa/MasterCard, Check, or a Money Order.

REGISTRATION INFORMATION

What about my privacy rights?

Student information is confidential and not released to the public except for information designated as "Directory Information." Directory information is (a) student name, (b) participation in recognized activities and sports, (c) dates of attendance, (d) degrees and awards received, (e) the most recent previous educational agency or institution attended. Students who do not want Directory information released must notify Admissions and Records in writing. The Cabrillo College Catalog describes student record access and privacy rights as required by the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (Section 438, Public Law 93-380) in more detail. I am a parent of a high school student attending Cabrillo College. Can I access my child's student records?

No. Under Section 49061 of the Education Code, parents of community college students do not have the right of access to their children's student records, regardless of whether the student is under the age of 18. Also, under federal law (Section 1232G of Title 20 of the United States Code), there is a general right of parental access to student records, but not for college students, regardless of age.

What are residency requirements for Cabrillo College?

To qualify as a California resident, you must meet the following criteria:

1. You have lived in California for at least one year and a day before the beginning of the semester.
2. You can demonstrate your intent to establish California residence. The list of approved documents is available online at www.cabrillo.edu and in Admissions and Records.

In addition to the above, if you are:

1. 18 years old and one of your parents has lived in California the required time.
2. Under 18 years old and your parent has lived in California the required time.
3. Not a United States citizen you must be able to verify that you have applied for residency with the United States Citizenship and Immigrations Services (USCIS) at least one year and one day immediately preceding the beginning of the semester, or that you have a visa that allows you to establish California residency.

AB 540 allows certain nonresident students who have attended three years of high school in California and received a high school diploma or its equivalent exemption from paying nonresident tuition.

Remember: If your residency status changes from nonresident to resident while you are enrolled at Cabrillo, you must submit a new application for admission with a statement of legal residence and documentation to Admissions and Records to change your status. We will not make retroactive changes.

What if I'm a resident of another state?

Residents of other states must pay nonresident tuition and fees. See fee chart on page 5.

What if I'm an International Student?

Students from other countries pay higher International student tuition and fees. See chart on page 5. New International students may not be admitted in the wintertime. International student admission requirements are listed in the Cabrillo College Catalog. Can I take a course more than one time?

You may repeat a course under the conditions specified on page 28 of the Cabrillo College *Catalog*. If you want to repeat a course that is not designated as repeatable, obtain a course repetition petition from Admissions and Records before you register. Obtain the appropriate signatures, if necessary, and return to Admissions and Records, to register in person.

How can I get a transcript? How much do they cost?

Get transcripts from Admissions and Records in either Aptos or Watsonville Center. The first two transcripts are free to all students; after that the cost is \$3 for each additional transcript. How do I find out about textbooks?

Information about all textbooks can be found on <http://cabrillobooks.net/>. Required and recommended texts can be found there, including the price and the ISBN number for the books.

What Is Assessment?

Cabrillo's assessment (placement testing) service will provide you with information about your skill levels and placement in English, reading, and math courses. It is not a college admissions test.

Assessment requirements:

1. Have an application on file at Admissions and Records five days in advance of your test.
2. Know your Cabrillo Student ID number.
3. Bring a photo ID.
4. Include appropriate working email address.

What Do I Do First?

Who Needs Assessment?

- You need assessment if you plan to do any of the following:
 1. Earn an AA or AS degree or certificate.
 2. Satisfy math, English, chemistry or other course prerequisites.
 3. Register for more than six units.
- You DO NOT need assessment if you show a counselor or Admissions and Records documentation for one of the following:
 1. Successful completion of previous college level math or English course(s).
 2. Placement results from another California community college.
 3. Advanced Placement (AP) Test with scores of 3, 4, or 5 in English or calculus.

Do I need to participate in Orientation?

Yes. Orientation is one of the important ways to become oriented to and integrated into college. It is one of the Matriculation services we provide for your planned progress towards your educational goal. There are several ways to meet this requirement. You may complete an online orientation from home or in selected locations on campus. Log into <https://sirena.cabrillo.edu> You may also complete this requirement by attending a counselor-led session after the assessment test where your scores will be distributed or you can enroll in CG51 (a credit class). All orientation options will review college programs and majors, support services, success strategies and ways to maximize your time at Cabrillo.

Do I take an assessment test for an ESL class?

ESL students do NOT take a placement test in order to enroll in classes. New students must attend an Information Session where information on each class level is provided. The students then select the appropriate class and register. This is called "informed self-placement." Schedules for Information Sessions are available in Admissions and Records, the Assessment Office, the Watsonville Center and online at www.cabrillo.edu/services/assessment.

¿Necesita tomar la prueba de evaluación para una clase de ESL?

Los estudiantes de ESL (Inglés como Segundo Idioma) no necesitan tomar una prueba de evaluación para inscribirse en clases de ESL. Tuition & Fees: Mandatory

(set by the California Legislature and subject to change):

1. Tuition:

California Resident	\$ 26 per unit (or)
Non-Resident of California	\$ 194 tuition per unit plus \$26 per unit

 (or)

International Students	\$ 5 per unit (capital outlay fee) plus \$194 non-resident tuition per unit plus \$26 per unit for citizens and residents of a foreign country.
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The Capital Outlay Fee may be waived for economic hardship or for the victim of persecution or discrimination in their home countries.

2. Health Services Fee \$ 14

The Student Health Services fee provides a variety of services. For more information, see Student Services or www.cabrillo.edu. Ed Code Section 76355 allows exemption from this fee solely to those students who depend upon prayer for healing in accordance with the teachings of a bona fide religious sect, denomination or organization. Petition forms are available in Admissions and Records. Documentation of religious affiliation is required. Board of Governors' Waiver (BOG) students will be charged the Health Services fee.

What if my fees are paid by an Agency?

If an agency or program is paying your fees, a voucher or "authorization to bill" must be sent instead of a payment within five days of registration. Remember to keep a copy of the voucher or authorization. Cabrillo will send a bill to the agency or program. Fee-paying agencies or programs include (but are not limited to): CareerWorks, Summer Migrant Program, E.D.D., Disability Compensation, Veterans Programs, Employers.

Financial Aid

Students with Board of Governors fee waivers for Fall 2009 are eligible for BOG waivers in Wintersession 2010. REGISTRATION INFORMATION

How can I get a refund or reversal of charges for a class?

Only if you officially drop the class on or before the first day of class. If the class is canceled, your tuition and fees will be refunded. Different deadlines apply for short-term courses.

The Admissions & Records Office DOES NOT drop students when fees are not paid, and fees remain payable even if you do not attend, unless you officially drop the class before on or before the first class. If you decide not to continue in a class, drop the class yourself. If you wait for the instructor to drop you, you will not receive a refund or reversal of charges.

Refund checks will be mailed to your last known address. MasterCard or VISA payments may be credited if you paid online by credit card. There is a \$10 processing fee charged on all refunds, except for canceled classes. Bus passes and/or parking permits must be turned in by the same deadline for refunds.

What is the deadline for refund/reversal of charges of transportation fees?

Parking permits may be returned on or before January 4, 2010 for a full refund or reversal of charges. Bus pass charges cannot be refunded once its distribution has started, unless the actual bus pass is returned to Student Affairs or Admissions & Records. No bus pass charges will be reversed or refunded after January 4, 2010.

Oops. My check bounced.

A \$15 service fee will be charged for all checks returned to the college for account difficulties. If your check is returned, you will be notified by mail. Your registration and transcripts will be held until all delinquencies are cleared. Returned check delinquencies may not be paid with another personal check, but must be paid with cash, money order, or cashier's check.
