Q: Does USC have a math requirement?

A: Colleges throughout California expect students to have mastered the equivalent of intermediate college algebra with at least a "C" grade. USC is no exception. Students who did not complete advanced algebra in high school should plan to take intermediate algebra or higher at the college level. Many USC degree programs have more demanding math requirements; refer to the *USC Catalogue* for more information.
